Know your officials

Develop a cheat sheet

- Party
- Personal Interests (hobbies, schools attended)
- Legislative Interests (what committees they serve on, what bills they're working on)

Civics 101

Not as scary as it seems

- 1. Introduce the Bill
- 2. Goes to Committee(s)
- 3. Floor vote
- 4. Conference Committee

How to Communicate

Most effective (in order):

- Face to face meeting
- Phone conversation
- Personalized letter
- Personalized email
- Phone message
- Personalized tweet or social media
- Petitions, postcards, just-click emails, etc.

Information to use

Most effective:

- Information for how the policy would impact the official's district
- Constituents' reasons for supporting (or not) the policy
- Personal stories

Tips for meeting

Four keys:

- Be prepared
- Be respectful
- Stay on topic
- Leave behind a written summary

Dos and Don'ts

Do get to the topic

Don't let small talk eat away your time

<u>Do</u> bring your personal story

Do bring fresh, credible information

Don't threaten electoral consequences

Do ask for support of your position

Don't burn bridges
